TODAY'S PROGRAM



Karen A. Holbrook is the regional chancellor of University of South Florida Sarasota Manatee. Dr. Holbrook earned her B.S. and M.S. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in zoology. After teaching at Ripon College, she earned a Ph.D. in biological structure from the University of Washington School of Medicine where she served as a postdoctoral fellow in dermatology, faculty member and research administrator, and became a professor of biological structure and medicine. She was the first woman to be named Associate Dean at the UW School of Medicine. She has served as Dean of the Graduate School at the University of Florida and Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost at the University of Georgia. From 2002 to 2007, she was the 13th presiding president of Ohio State University. She served as senior adviser to the president of the University of South Florida System. In 2017, while serving as executive vice president at USFSM, she replaced Terry Osborn as chancellor.

PREVIOUS MEETING (04/17/2019) BY JIM HENRY



Dr. Eric Haura, Director, Lung Comprehensive Research Center and interim chair, Department of Thoracic Oncology, explained to us the advancements in lung cancer treatment, concentrating on genetically-targeted cancer therapies. He is interested in biomarkers to predict therapeutic responses in lung cancer and is active in developing molecular based therapeutic clinical trials, and explained in understandable layman terms the advantages of this type advancement, which is an ongoing but successful effort in battling cancer.



Simply put, cancer cells are corrupted personal cells. By determining the genetic composition and molecular circuitry of the cancer cells, it is possible to help each patient's immune system, which in effect has been hijacked by the corrupted cancer cell, to overcome the hijacking and subdue the abnormal proteins that corrupted the personal cell. This makes it possible to treat lung cancer with oral medicines instead of chemotherapy.
